more accessible/clear permitting process

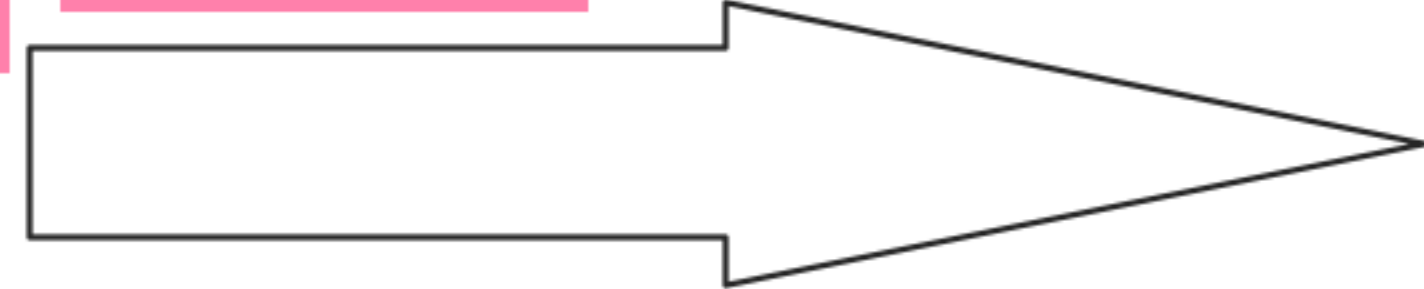
